Workshop 4 - Mercy Health & Mercy Education

Extending Horizons: The Power of Us - intergenerational connections through Mercy ministry collaboration

The iGEN Learning program started as a collaboration between Mercy Health Bendigo (Bethlehem Aged Care and Golden Rise Seniors Living), Catherine McAuley College Bendigo and Australian Catholic University and has evolved into a nationally recognised intergenerational program that is now expanding to other Mercy Health and Mercy Education sites. Workshop 5 - Mercy Education (Round 1)

Workshop 5 - Mercy Education (Round 2)

Workshop 6 - Mercy Indigenous (First Nations) Alliance Expanding Horizons: Partnerships with First Nations people

For our Mercy whānau and yakapna (family) we have a shared opportunity and responsibility to support both reconciliation and positive outcomes for Indigenous (First Nations) peoples. To help that, indigenous people from Australia, Torres Strait and Aotearoa, New Zealand are coming together to form an alliance through Mercy. This workshop will explore the shared philosophy (kaupapa), its goals and is an opportunity for participants to be involved by way of yarn (korero) and deep listening (Dadirri) in what it could mean for ministries. The MacKillop Family Services Stretch RAP Action 26 and Deliverable 26.3 "Develop and grow a First Nations network across Mercy Ministry Companions in Australia and New Zealand" supports this initiative.

ANGELA SCAFFIDI -CONFERENCE FACILITATOR

Angela Scaffidi is a founder and managing partner of SenateSHJ, an Australasian consultancy that specialises in change, reputation and communication. She is deputy chair of Challenge: supporting kids with cancer, one of Australia's longest running children's cancer charities. She is chair of The Missed Foundation, Australia's only not-for-profit that supports the families of long-term missing people. ARCHBISHOP SHANE MACKINLAY - KEYNOTE 1

Archbishop Shane Mackinlay is to be installed as Archbishop of Brisbane on September 11, 2025. He has been Bishop of Sandhurst in Victoria, Australia, since October 2019. Prior to his ordination as a priest in 1991, he completed degrees in theology and physics and subsequently undertook graduate studies in philosophy at the Catholic University of Leuven, Belgium, where he completed a master's degree and a Doctorate. As a priest, he had a variety of pastoral, diocesan and academic appointments, including nine years as Master of Catholic Theological College, Melbourne, in the University of Divinity. Since becoming a bishop, he has been elected as Vice-President of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia and was one of the Australian delegates at the Synod for a Synodal Church. In 2022, he was appointed as Co-Chair of the Methodist-Roman Catholic International Commission



DR SONJA HOOD AM - KEYNOTE 2

Dr Sonja Hood AM is the CEO of the Scanlon Foundation, a leading advocate for Australia's social cohesion. She has more than thirty years' experience in public policy and community development, with extensive leadership roles in government, sport, not for profits, and philanthropy.

Sonja is President of the North Melbourne Football Club, a Director of the Scanlon Foundation, and Board Chair of the Foundation's three satellite organisations: Welcoming Australia, Community Hubs Australia, and the Scanlon Foundation Research Institute. She is also a member of the Community Directors Council.
